The Herman Ostrow School of Dentistry of USC is seeking candidates for a part-time, non-tenure-track faculty position as a Clinical Assistant Professor in the Division of Biomedical Sciences. This is a 60% position.

Responsibilities will include Problem Based Learning (PBL) case facilitation, development of PBL cases, construction and administration of examinations, enhancing the PBL infrastructure, educational research activities related to PBL, monitoring student progress and preparing students for the National Dental Board Examination Parts I and II.

Candidates must have a MS or PhD degree in a biological field and/or a DDS, MD or equivalent degree. Health care education experience is considered a plus. Preference will be given to candidates with expertise and/or experience in all aspects of the PBL pedagogy (i.e. facilitating cases, writing new cases and revising old cases, monitoring student performance, evaluating program outcomes, performing educational scholarly activities related to the PBL pedagogy, etc.)
