
Earlier this week — and for the first time ever — we held an intraoral scanning training session for our ASPID and DDS Classes. The ASPID Class of 2023 and the DDS Class of 2024 were trained to use intraoral scanners (supplementing their use of traditional impressions and mounted stone casts) for their preclinical orthodontics module by our orthodontics graduate **students**. It's an exciting development — made possible by the acquisition of four intraoral scanners, thanks to a generous donation by Dr. Ralph **Allman** and his late wife, the thoroughly-missed **Mrs. Sigrid Allman**. We often say we prepare our students for dentistry, not as it is practiced today, but as it will be practiced in 5, 10, 15 years from now, and I truly believe that this type of intraoral scanning will be commonplace in the coming years, giving our ASPID/DDS students an added benefit as they enter the workforce. More than that, it's also beneficial for our graduate orthodontics students who not only got the opportunity to conduct and oversee more than 180 intraoral scans, but also got an opportunity to teach this material. As they say, you truly show you have mastered a subject when you can teach it well. I'd like to thank Advanced Orthodontics Program Director Dr. Glenn Sameshima as well as Dr. Robert Gire, Dr. Stuart Hoffman and Dr. Hovhanness Shnorhokian for their efforts in preparing our DDS, ASPID and Orthodontics students to use this groundbreaking technology.

In other exciting news, we received the necessary approvals to resume operations at Union Rescue Mission (URM). We will resume operations at 50 percent capacity for the first two weeks before ramping back up to full capacity thereafter, conditions permitting. As you will remember, we had been seeing a limited number of URM patients in the mobile clinics behind the dental school. Resuming treatment at the Union Rescue Mission will allow us to provide treatment to even more individuals from this most vulnerable of populations. I would like to thank **Dr. Roseann Mulligan**, whose leadership during these challenging times has been so incredibly helpful. I would also like

to thank **Dr. Mehdi Mohammadi** (who recently took over as Interim Director of our dental clinic at the Union Rescue Mission), **Dr. Laura (Kathy) Elizondo**, **Dr. Melina Grigorian**, **Dr. Santosh Sundaresan** and **Dr. Nineli Zadourian** as well as staff members **Ms. Rachelle Bautista**, **Mr. Bobby Boyer**, **Mr. Alexander Castaneda**, **Ms. Jessica Luna**, **Mr. Edward Mondorf** and **Mr. Edwin Salgado** for their efforts. This has been 16 months of alternating moments of grueling wait and Herculean effort to be able to reach this milestone, and you all played such pivotal roles.



We were incredibly proud to find out that we have been approved for T90/R90 training grant funding for our PhD students and postdocs by the National Institute of Dental and Craniofacial Research (NIDCR). This prestigious grant will financially support four PhD students and five post-docs — with a preference for students from underrepresented backgrounds — with a stipend, tuition, fees and a full benefit package that includes travel to conferences related to their specific areas of research as well as training-related experiences and lab equipment. The training grant's goal is to educate

outstanding scholars who wish to pursue basic, fundamental, translational or clinical research and prepare for careers relevant to dental and craniofacial disease and health.
